Detroit — U-SNAP-BAC and members of the Detroit City Council and community gathered this week to celebrate the makeover of 64 units of deeply affordable housing on the city's east side and the extension of that affordability for the next 30 years.

MorningSide Commons, located along Wayburn Street and Alter Road in District 4's MorningSide neighborhood, features 13 town homes at 50 percent area median income (AMI) and 51 at 60 percent AMI. Because the affordability is guaranteed for at least the next 30 years, residents will not have to worry about being priced out of their homes. U-SNAP-BAC is the owner and developer of the 32-building complex. The property is managed by Continental Management.



# East Warren Avenue Streetscape Project Underway

You may have noticed a few orange drums or what some call the 'Michigan Flower' and construction activity along East Warren Avenue between 3 Mile Drive and Cadieux Rd over the past few weeks. The City of Detroit is excited to share that construction for the streetscape project is officially underway!

After several months of working with stakeholders and neighbors, the Department of Public Works (DPW) is thrilled to make the community's vision for East Warren Avenue a reality. Overall, the plan is for East Warren Avenue to be a place that is safe, economically thriving, and welcoming for all residents, businesses, and visitors. The project also includes a dynamic plaza at Courville Street that can be used for parking and community events.

Some of the specific streetscape improvements include:

- · Pavement resurfacing
- New 6-foot-wide protected bike lanes
- New bus islands
- Sidewalk replacement and pedestrian curb ramps
- New street lighting and traffic signals
- Landscaping and plantings
- Various street signs, pavement markings, and furnishings

# E. Warren Farmers Market Returns for Third Season

The East Warren corridor welcomes back the E. Warren Farmers Market for their annual market from 5 pm to 8 pm. every Thursday through the summer. The former Pizza Hut on E. Warren and Bishop is now the permanent home of the weekly farmers market, hosting more than 30 local vendors and food trucks.

The market's return is testimony to its success, both as a celebration of local talent and for the direct economic impact on our community. Earnings of \$60,000 went back into the pockets of the 83 predominantly local, minority, and women-owned small businesses who participated in 2021. This was a 240% increase from the initial market launch in 2020.

It's more than just a market. It's an intentional space to cultivate businesses, share resources, and launch vendors into a sustainable career. Fourteen of the vendors last year were able to expand their businesses to both food trucks and brick and mortar locations.

Starting in 2020, at the height of the pandemic, the E. Warren Farmers Market has been home to a growing variety of vendors. From produce to skincare, jewelry to baked goods, and everything in between, the market showcases talent from across the east side. In addition to vendors, the market often features live music, resources from local partnerships and organizations, as well as a space to gather and eat from local food trucks.

Going into the 2022 season, the market is looking to host even more vendors, artists, and entertainment. Allowing people to showcase their talents, in hopes of continuing to help revitalize the community and reactivate the E. Warren corridor, the E. Warren Farmers Market is looking forward to seeing returning families and welcoming new visitors!

# Continued... MorningSide Commons to Undergo Major Renovations

Each of the 32 buildings received new HVAC; new kitchen appliances, cabinets and sinks, and faucets; new bathroom vanities, toilets, sinks, and shower fixtures; new flooring; new paint; and new lighting and ceiling fans. The apartments now meet MSHDA's Affordable Green Standards for efficiency.

The exterior also received major upgrades, including new roofing, new windows, new gutters and downspouts, new siding, new front and rear entry doors, new or repaired steps on the front and back of each unit, and new lighting and garage door replacement or repair.

Here's some of the other progress we've made:

- The Alger now has a new elevator pit and shaft to the rooftop patio and is awaiting the delivery of the cab in the next couple of weeks.
- We are a Community Partner assisting residents to complete the 2022 HOPE Application for Property Tax Exemptions. Call (313) 720-3904 for an appointment. (Unless otherwise scheduled, doors are open on Warren every Tuesday and Thursday 1-4 pm)

After over 35 years, in conjunction with the new E. Warren Streetscape, we will finally be able to bring water back into the building.

We are still working to replace the roof and install bathrooms as soon as possible in order to get a Certificate of Occupancy to get this beloved Theater opened.

The Friends of the Alger sincerely appreciate the efforts of all stakeholders. We know that the pride shown by our neighbors has moved us closer to reopening our neighborhood treasure - one of the last remaining neighborhood theaters in Detroit - with national, state, and local historic designations!

# Detroiters to City Council: We Want Safe, Affording Housing!

Residents of neighborhoods all over the city have been calling attention to the need for more housing support - through home repair loans, prioritizing rehabbing over demolition, preventing evictions, and constructing affordable housing. Members of City Council, including our own District 4 Councilmember Latisha Johnson, have been listening.

The \$426 million made available to Detroit through ARPA (the American Rescue Plan Act) have already been allocated, but after dozens of citizens spoke out at recent Council meetings, members of Council are looking for ways to shift some of those funds to better address housing insecurity.

# The City of Detroit now offers COVID-19 Test to Treat program

#### City of Detroit

• The Detroit Health Department to be the only health department in Michigan to offer rapid COVID-19 testing, on-site evaluation, and prescription COVID oral medication at a convenient and accessible location

The City of Detroit is partnering with the State of Michigan to expand services to treat residents with COVID-19. Detroiters who test positive for COVID-19 at a City testing site can be evaluated and receive antiviral medication. The services are free.

The Test to Treat program provides residents with a fast and easy way to get life-saving treatment for COVID-19. In this program, people can get tested at Test to Treat sites across the nation. If they test positive and medication is appropriate, they can receive antiviral pills at the visit. If other treatments are needed, referrals will be made to local partners. Oral medications are 90 percent effective at preventing severe illness due to COVID-19 but are only effective if treatment begins within five days of illness onset.

The Test to Treat program is currently available at Joseph Walker Williams, 8431 Rosa Parks Blvd., from 7 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday. Test to Treat is only available by appointment by calling (313) 230-0505.







He obviously touched many other lives as well, as evidenced by the outpouring of tributes on Nextdoor and his obituary page.


Tributes to Chris poured in from neighbors: "...He was the epitome of kindness and did have the greatest smile in the world."
