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
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Spotlight on the J Spot, Where Everyone Knows Your Name

After hours of hard work guests and neighbors gathered together to enjoy food, fun, and festivities at a block party to celebrate all of the amazing work being done in the Morningside neighborhood.

Just days later Habitat Detroit hosted a Home Dedication for the newest Habitat home, a beautifully restored house on Haverhill. Joining the more than 130 homes built or rehabbed by Habitat Detroit in MorningSide, this house was a labor of love. The Habitat team and countless volunteers worked tirelessly to breathe new life into the house as it was prepared to welcome the Flores family to their very own home sweet home.

The Flores family was surrounded by family, friends, neighbors, and community leaders as they were officially welcomed to the community. Excitement was in the air and the sun was shining as Gabby, Miguel, Jada, and Gracie (along with pup Phoebe) laughed, cried, and showed off their beautiful new space.

Since partnering with Habitat Detroit in May 2022, the entire Flores family has taken an active partnering role, from building sweat equity hours as volunteers at builds, attending events and classes, and working diligently to increase their buying power.

Upon viewing the house on Haverhill, we could see the joyful tears in their eyes as Gabby pointed out where she would put her plants, which room her girls would have, and how she would hang Christmas stockings along the fireplace mantel.

Former St. Matthew School To Be Repurposed for Affordable Housing

Construction work on "The Residences at St. Matthew" is now slated to begin mid-summer. The \$20M project will repurpose the St. Matthew School and Activities Building near Harper and Whittier into quality affordable apartments and permanent supportive housing. The buildings have been vacantfor over a decade but have been well-maintained and are structurally sound. The project will address the housing and health needs of many in the community.

"I'm excited to see this much needed and productive reuse of two vacant structures that were once important community assets." said Eric Dueweke, president of the MorningSide Board of Directors. "The project will definitely add value to our surrounding neighborhoods."

Eric is a member of the project's Community Engagement Team, which is composed of representatives from nearby community organizations and key project partners. The team meets regularly to provide updates and gather feedback.

The Residences at St. Matthew is a collaborative effort by St. Matthew Parish, Catholic Charities of Southeast Michigan (CCSEM), Cinnaire Solutions, Ethos Development Partners, Ascension Michigan, and civic leadership to create a new community resource that helps meet the city's great need for affordable housing. The property manager for the project will be KMG Prestige.

CCSEM is the lead sponsor for the project and is part of the national Catholic Charities USA (CCUSA) network. The Residences at St. Matthew is one of five affordable housing projects initiated by CCUSA in cities around the country. Part of the mission of Catholic Charities, both locally and nationally, is to provide housing solutions for disadvantaged families and individuals.

"The Residences at St. Matthew is, first and foremost, a project that addresses the needs of a diversity of people who at this time find themselves marginalized and simply need a hand up to provide them with a brighter future," said Father Duane Novelly, pastor of St. Matthew.

A total of 46 apartments will be available at The Residences at St. Matthew, consisting of 36 one-bedroom units, 4 two-bedroom units, and 6 studio units. Health services will be provided to tenants through a partnership with Ascension Michigan. The former gymnasium will be converted into a multi-purpose space offering programs and services provided by CCSEM and Ascension Health that will be available to tenants and community residents.

The housing project will be open to all individuals and families who meet income requirements set by the Michigan State Housing Development Authority (MSHDA). The units are intended for households earning no more than 30%, 50% and 60% of area median income. MSHDA is providing project-based rental subsidies for 25 of the units, as permanent supportive housing for formerly homeless households. The City of Detroit is providing rental subsidy for 7 units. Residents in these units will pay no more than 30% of their income for rent (which includes utilities).

Adore the Dandelion!

You may see dandelions as pesky weeds, but did you know that they offer many benefits? These little yellow gems can improve soil health, have medicinal properties, and provide nutrition to humans and wildlife!

Dandelions are known to benefit the soil and grow where they are needed. They thrive in soil that is acidic, low in calcium, and compacted. If you let them alone, dandelions will improve your soil. Their deep taproot reaches deep down breaking up compacted soil and allowing water and air to circulate freely. The taproot also brings up essential nutrients like nitrogen and calcium, which enriches and helps neutralize our dense, clay-heavy Michigan soil when the plant dies. Dandelions will also fill in the shaded areas in your lawn that are not optimum for grass. Keeping some dandelions mingled in with your lawn can greatly support the vitality of your yard.

Dandelions have been around forever (okay, only 30 million years) and have been used by ancient cultures for their medicinal properties. The Egyptians, Greeks, Chinese, and Romans used dandelions to treat liver and digestive ailments, fever, skin conditions, and promote urinary tract health. Europeans brought dandelions along with them on the Mayflower in 1620 and Native Americans quickly adopted the plant as a food and medicinal herb.

WebMD reports that while more research is needed on the medical uses of dandelions, the plant has been shown to have diuretic, antibacterial and anti-inflammatory effects. Dandelion roots contain inulin, which promotes healthy probiotics in our gut, and tea from the root contains polysaccharides that help the liver filter harmful chemicals in the foods we eat. The potassium in dandelion tea may also help to stimulate the heartbeat, help the kidney filter toxins more effectively, and improve blood flow.

Dandelions are also edible and enjoyed by people all over the world. In Europe and North America, dandelion leaves are used in salads and cooked dishes, and the flowers are used to make dandelion wine.

In Korea, dandelion leaves are used in soups and stews, while in Vietnam, the flowers are used to make a tea that is believed to support liver health. The plant is high in vitamins A, C, and K and is also a good source of iron, folate, vitamin D, calcium, potassium, and zinc. The tender young leaves can be used as you would arugula, or you can sauté them as you would any green. The leaves are best picked before the flowers bloom, as they become bitter afterward.

It's also fun for kids to eat the little yellow flowers on their own - they have a fresh, slightly sweet honey taste! Just make sure they haven't been sprayed with chemicals before eating and remove the bitter green base first.

Perhaps most importantly, dandelions are an essential food source for wildlife - at least 93 species of insects feast on their nectar and another 33 species of wildlife rely on the plant for food. They are one of the first flowers to bloom in the spring and provide much-needed nectar for bees, moths, and butterflies. Dandelion seeds are also an important food source for birds. By leaving at least some dandelions in your yard, you can help support pollinator and bird populations.

MorningSide and East English Village neighbors joined forces on Saturday, April 29th, for the first of three East Outer Drive Clean-Ups. The small band of volunteers picked up twenty-three bags of debris and cleaned weeds from the median curbs at E. Warren and East Outer Drive and Frankfort. 
In this instance, 8-year old author, George Laethem IV has been influenced by the power of reading that he is now a published author. Even more special, George hails right here from the Motor City.

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






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


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
