Enrollment at Agape Love, which accepts private-pay and DHS, gives families all-access to any of the programs that they qualify for. The Motor City Match recipient says, "We have a partnership with Matrix, so early-Head Start programming is something we can offer to families."

The strength of growing a well-rounded facility lies in partnerships that can provide funding for families, continuing education for staff, and operational needs, like furniture. According to a 2015 study by the Kresge Foundation entitled The System We Need: A Neighborhood Snapshot of Early Childhood in Detroit, most 4-5 star early childcare facilities require not only great staff, but consistent revenue to operate and they, "combine various funding streams to provide full-year, full-day care and education." Currently located off Roxbury St in a home converted to meet the regulatory needs for licensed childcare, ALCC is primed for growth. "We definitely need to expand," says Sheri. "Most of my kids started with me when they were younger and now, they're getting older and ageout because we didn't have space." So, Director Williams has opened the waiting list for children and will expand her staff for the transition on the horizon.

Agape Love Childcare Center's mission is to, "provide a nurturing, loving, safe, and healthy environment, where children can thrive, blossom and grow to be successful individuals." Having a desire to provide quality, holistic services to more children and their families, Sheri and her team are in the final stages of a move to the new location of Agape Love Childcare Center to 16225 E Warren at Three-Mile. The once church, now an early childcare haven, is receiving its final coats of kidcaptivating blue exterior paint, signage, and interior, up-to-code, upgrades. What Sheri saw as a growing need for families prompted the move. "I see a community on the rise. This is the perfect time for us to be in the community because we are building a high-quality, state-ofthe-art facility, second to none.

We pride ourselves on investing our all. We are the only five star rated facility in 48224." That rating by Great Start to Quality or GSQ, funded by the Department of Education, both sets and evaluates quality standards in education and early care in the State of Michigan. The current center has met those standards as well as other benchmarks in staff education and training to meet various learning styles.

Is the Land Value Tax Good for Morningsiders? Part 1

Ever since the mayor introduced the Land Value Tax plan (LVT) last May, the flow of information and misinformation has been enough to make anyone's head spin. This is the first of a two-part series designed to analyze the arguments for and against the plan, so that you can make an informed decision.

First, a very simplified recap of what the LVT would and would not do:

- It **would** approximately double taxes on most land, including the land under the structures on that land.
- It would not increase the tax rate on side lots (up to four), community gardens, pocket parks, or community recreational spaces on land purchased from the Land Bank. (Those exemptions were created based on community feedback about the original plan.)
- It would decrease taxes on occupied structures, either homes or functioning businesses, by an average of 17%. The vast majority (97%) of Detroiters should see a property tax cut.


What's the point of taxing land and buildings separately? Supporters of the LVT say that the higher property taxes on Detroit's vast array of vacant land will make it too expensive for investors to just sit on, prompting them to either develop it or sell it. More on that later.

The LVT still has a long road ahead. It needs to be approved first by the state legislature, which kicked the can down the road last November. Many pundits believe it will eventually get through the Democratic majority legislature. Then it needs the approval of City Council, and finally the voters.

Of course, the devil is always in the details. To learn about the LVT plan from an expert, I turned to Alex Alsup, VP of Research & Development at Regrid, a storehouse of nation-wide property data. Alex has been working on and writing about property tax issues since 2011. He is familiar with neighborhoods all over the city, including Morningside. Equally important, he's not employed by or beholden to the mayor in any way. In fact, he says they've disagreed on most property tax issues in the past.

According to Alex, the LVT is intended to be "revenue-neutral" that is, it shouldn't change the city's overall tax revenue. "A sudden change in tax structure can be a shock to the system," he says. "The goal is to encourage better land use and development....The hope is that there'll be increased revenue down the line as a result of new development."

What will determine the success or failure of the LVT, he says, is whether and how it changes behavior. Speculators have several options if the LVT is adopted: pay the higher taxes but still do nothing with the land; walk away and let it go into foreclosure; develop or sell it; or pay just enough taxes to stay out of foreclosure.

Here's where the size of a investor's holdings can make a difference, Alex says. If you only own one commercial lot or two, you won't see much increase in your overall tax burden, so you may just pay the higher taxes and continue to sit on the land.

On the other hand, the big land holders may see an overall tax increase large enough to prompt them to develop the land (or pay just enough of the higher taxes to stay out of foreclosure).

The primary concern of most residents, of course, is what would happen to their own tax bill. Fortunately, the city website has a <u>tax</u> <u>estimator</u>, which Alex believes is a reliable tool. I put my own address into the calculator as an example. My husband and I paid \$1,336 in property taxes in 2023. According to the estimator, in 2024 we would pay \$1,086 – a savings of \$250, or approximately 18%.

Even though the tax on the land under and around our home would double, that's more than made up for by the tax cut on the home itself. And that's what the LVT is supposed to do for the vast majority of Detroit property owners.

Let's look now at a couple of properties on the E. Warren business corridor. The Orchard Lake resident who owns the vacant lot at the corner of E. Warren and Audubon paid \$420 in 2023. Under the LVT, she'd pay \$950 in 2024. This is the only lot in Detroit she owns, and so far she's refused offers to buy the lot. We'll see if the \$530 tax increase will prompt her to do something with the land.

Another lot, at the corner of E. Warren and Bedford, which holds a partially-demolished building, generated \$370 of taxes in 2023. Under the LVT, the Ypsilanti owner would pay an additional \$450 on the same property, for a total of \$820. As for taxes on the derelict building itself, it wouldn't be affected by the LVT. It's pretty certain that the LVT would lower the tax bills of Morningside homeowners. What's less certain is the impact on commercial development and the city's overall financial health. That's the issue we'll consider in next month's installment, along with various concerns about the LVT. In the meantime, if you have concerns or questions about the LVT, please send them to

Infrastructure Improvements Now Underway in Morningside

Many of our older homes in Morningside, just like those in Flint, Benton Harbor, Eastpointe and elsewhere, get our drinking water delivered through pipes made from lead. Thanks to a new program of the Detroit Water and Sewerage Department (DWSD), over 500 neighborhood houses will soon have their lead service lines replaced.

In May of 2023, DWSD began a neighborhoodby-neighborhood approach to replacing lead service lines. Neighborhoods are being prioritized if they have a density of housing built prior to 1945, have a significant number of children and/or seniors in the area, and are primarily low-income households based on Census data. Lead service line replacement includes replacing the lead line with a new copper pipe from the City's water main (located in the street) into the resident's house to the water meter. There is no cost to the customer for this work!

The DWSD contractor started exploratory digging in late January on four streets in Morningside:

- Balfour between Mack and Warren
- Chatsworth between Mack and Warren
- Berkshire between Mack and Warren
- Buckingham between Mack and Warren

Exploratory digging requires the contractor to dig a small hole in the front yard to verify if each house has a lead service line. Later, the contractor will leave a door hanger notice for the resident to call and schedule a lead service line replacement appointment. If it's confirmed that the resident has a lead service line, they will receive a free water pitcher and filters as a precaution.

Actual service line replacements are scheduled to begin in April or May. The contractor will make an appointment with each property owner to enter their home and complete the replacement process. Someone over age 18 must be present during the 2 hours work is being done. When all homes in the neighborhood are finished, any lawns damaged in the process will be seeded and mulched. Sidewalk sections will also be replaced if necessary.

A zoom community meeting was held on February 1 for the streets within the project limits. Door hanger packets containing detailed project information were distributed about a week prior to that meeting. Morningside is truly blessed to be one of the first neighborhoods receiving water line upgrades. The value of this improvement is over \$10,000 per house. Although it is unknown at this time when the remainder of our community will experience this benefit, the State of Michigan is requiring each city to replace all lead lines by 2040.

New Beginnings on Three Mile

U-SNAP-BAC is a local non-profit that has had a presence in the Morningside neighborhood for over 30 years. They have been working on housing redevelopment work on the East Side of Detroit since they were founded with the goal to empower residents to impact the future of Detroit as stated in their mission. They do this in a variety of ways: from new housing development and renovations, to connecting people to housing resources and building coalitions. In Morningside alone they have built or renovated around 80 homes. This year they are adding two more homes to the list.

One of their latest efforts has been rehabbing two houses on Three Mile which they purchased from the Detroit Landbank Authority. The goal is to renovate these homes completely - from needed HVAC, plumbing, and electrical systems, to brand new roofs and finishes – and sell them to low-to-moderateincome first time homebuyers. This allows these individuals build equity while helping to stabilize the community. Linda Smith has been the executive director of U-SNAP-BAC since 1995 and has worked hard to get these projects underway. The first of the two homes is well into construction and the construction has a local story too.

The general contractor for the project, Steve Manning, is a local himself. He currently lives on Mack and has been in the area for 30 years. Working on projects this close to home means a lot to him. Besides these two houses, Steve has worked on many others in the neighborhood. He started working on rehabbing homes when he was 22 years old and has been a licensed contractor since 2007. To him the work he does is more than just work. He told me "This is not what I do, it's what I am. If I hit the lottery and I didn't have to work another day in my life, I would still do it". And that passion is clear to anyone who talks to him. He currently does his rehab work during the day and works a full-time night shift job at Chrysler.

His crew has worked tirelessly on this project, recently completing the roof on the first home, and continuing exterior improvement efforts. He says the greatest challenge on the projects so far has been trying to deal with the Michigan winter weather the past month. Though the cold temps and snow delayed some of the roof work, Steve and the team are confident they are on track to create a beautiful home for this great cause.

Let's Talk Trash: Weekly Bulk Trash Collection Coming Soon! The Morningsider

For years, Morningsiders have complained about blight in our neighborhood, most of it caused by investors renovating homes and dumping the debris on front berms or by residents who pay no attention to the bulk trash pickup schedule. That's about to change.

Beginning June 1, sights like this pile of trash on Waveney at Bedford should be much less common. After soliciting feedback from thousands of residents, City Council voted earlier this month to increase the frequency of bulk trash, yard waste, and recycling pickup from bi-weekly to weekly. Even better, trash will be picked up from side streets and vacant lots, too.

To pay for the increase in services, solid waste fees will increase from \$240 to \$250 on July 1, followed by additional \$10 increases in 2025 and 2026.

East siders will also have a new provider – Priority Waste Management – which is replacing GFL Environmental due to residents' complaints about their service.


